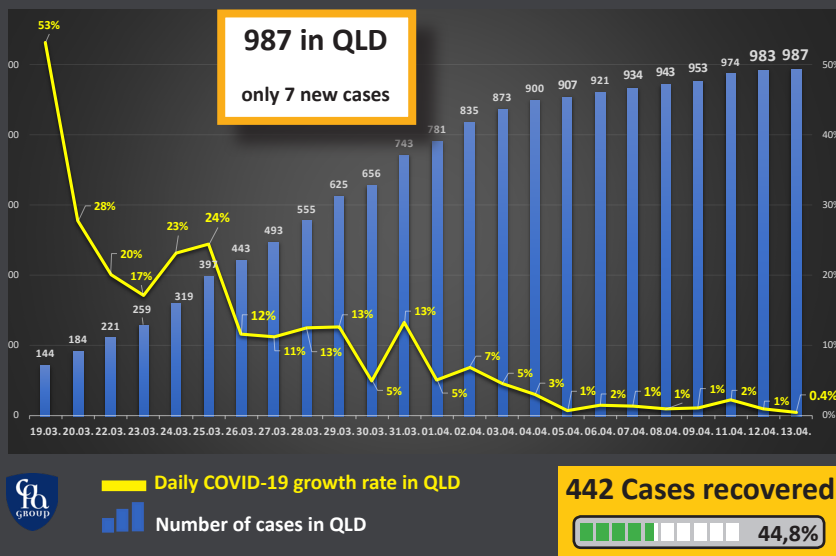

Australia (14.04.2020, 0400 am)
6,359 Total cases confirmed
61 Deaths confirmed

3,494 Cases recovered **54.9%**

Latest updates:

- QLD 987, NSW 2,863, ACT 103, NT 27, SA 431, TAS 144, VIC 1,281, WA 523.
- Australian death toll rises past 60, but just 33 new cases confirmed overnight.
- Tasmania has confirmed another 11 cases of COVID-19 overnight, all of them linked to an outbreak of the virus in the state's north-west. Another eight healthcare workers were among those testing positive, meaning 43 healthcare workers have now contracted coronavirus in the region.

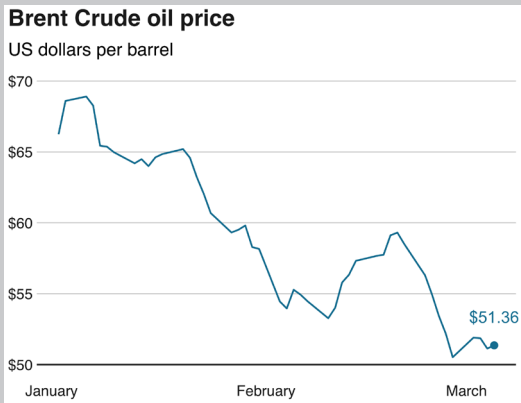

RACQ is asking everyone to follow the recommendations of health experts and take measures to protect themselves. It is important to not get complacent when filling up the car, touching a pump should be like touching any other surface. It is recommended that motorists may also want to wipe down their steering wheel and door handles as well, and remember to keep a 1.5 metre distance when lining up to pay for their fuel.
